INTRODUCTION

There were 25 entries to this, the third, Village Ventures Competition. Though there has been a decrease in the number of entries since last year, the projects were of a high standard, again demonstrating the ingenuity and commitment of village people in. helping themselves.

The Competition aims to encourage village projects in two ways:

By giving an extra spur to those already running., the knowledge that someone from outside the village will be having a. critical look at the project (in the friendliest possible way!) can help to keep things going and keep standards up.

Secondly, the Competition aims to draw attention to just what can be done in villages, to encourage others to do the same.

The publicity obtained for Village Ventures is invaluable in spreading, ideas, and we are indebted to our local newspapers and radio for their help in this.

The Report too, is written in the hope that others will pick up ideas and take them back to their own villages.

Last year I pointed out a dearth of ventures from the Vale of White Horse District, the villages met the challenge,- nearly half the entries came from the Vale District this year.

We have had no projects aiming to tackle the problem of employment. The Oxfordshire Rural Community Council are concerned about the difficulties of being unemployed and living in a village. We hope that next year some village will attempt to meet the challenge of helping the unemployed; we look forward to receiving their entry.

It has been suggested that villages may run out of ideas, and cease taking on new projects. We have had no indication that village projects are slowing down. We hope that the Competition will continue to run and to demonstrate the increasingly wide scope for new village projects.
