

## 1 Westfield Road

This older stone cottage next to the Sun Inn may originally have been part of the Sun's property. In the early 20<sup>th</sup> century Mr and Mrs Hinton lived here. Cranny' Hinton always wore a bonnet, and Mr Hinton, senior, was in charge of the coal merchants beside the railway station.

## 2 Westfield Road, Quarry House

This large, family house, with its bay windows and stone mullions, was built by the Cullum family who probably built most of the other brick houses in Westfield Road, too. But this was the Family home, adjacent to their quarry, and attached to the house where his Foreman lived.

## 3 Westfield Road

This is the left-hand of a pair of brick cottages. Mr and Mrs Hall lived here. He was a painter and decorator at Cullum's.

## 4 Westfield Road

This double-fronted house, attached to the Cullum's own, although nearly a foot lower, was used by Cullum's foreman, Arthur Chapman and his family. There were three daughters: Evelyn, Thelma and Diana. Mrs Mildred (?) Chapman was a lady's maid at Shotover House. Later, 'Milky' Allen and his wife lived here, with their daughter, Catherine. Their grandson, John (or is it Tim?) Barker, now lives here with his family (2005).

## 5 Westfield Road

This is the right-hand of a pair of brick cottages. Mrs Emma Sa(u)nders lived here with her daughter, Nancy. Nancy married Jack Ingram whose father was the chauffeur at Holton Park. They lived in Holton Lodge.

## 6 Westfield Road

This is another large double-fronted house built of brick and stone. The front of the house is brick but, as the photograph shows, the walls (and probably the back) are of stone. It was probably built for another of Cullum's senior workmen.

## 7 Westfield Road

This is the left-hand of a pair of brick cottages. Jim White, who looked after the church boiler, lived here with his wife, and Miss Ellison, the school-teacher, who lodged with them.
