

This was an interesting talk on lawn care by a professional lawn expert who has maintained some of the best golf courses in the country. There were many tips for keeping our garden lawns in good shape.










MAY 11th

The Biscoes of Holton House — Kevin Heritage

This was the third of a series of evenings about the Biscoe family and their association with Holton House, now part of Wheatley Park School. Talks in previous years have been centred around the large number of photographic plates that were discovered a few years ago which gave a fascinating insight to the lives of the estate owners and local villagers at the turn of the twentieth century.

In 2010 the meeting was held at the school and we were able to see many of the sites featured in the photographs. Members were split into two

groups one led by Kevin, with the other led by his colleague Nigel Phillips.

After an excellent tour of the grounds, including the Broome Oak and the moat, we were able to visit the exhibitions in the Old Gate House, the Venison House and the David John Centre. Many items found in the grounds or associated with the site were on display.




Outing to the Imperial War Museum London

This was about life during the Second World War, part of which was about the "Dig for Victory" campaign, that encouraged ordinary people to become gardeners and reduce the reliance on imported foodstuffs. This was exactly why our Association was formed 70 years ago and therefore a visit was necessary

because of a housewives pail.













Alan has been a regular speaker at VP A meetings for a number of years.








The Royal National Lifeboat Association — Trevor Woods



The Royal National Lifeboat Institution is entirely funded by public subscription and members were able to support this worthy cause after the event.







There were no organised activities but members were busy in their gardens and allotments choosing and preparing their exhibits for the 70" Annual Show in September.












