IT is a fort and it is a class-room. It is a playground and a theatre. It is a small boys' dream conker-land, where the husks split open as they hit the pavement and lie waiting for the children to pick them up when they arrive at school each morning.

At the Wheatley County Primary School, Oxon, builders have paved and walled round the old chestnut tree to make an open-air class-room with a difference.

Mr. Glenville Evans, the headmaster, said: "When this year the school was extended for the third time in six years we decided it was such a beautiful tree we made recommendations that it should be kept."

Now it is the centre of work and play for 286 children. During lessons in the fine weather it is used for drama, dancing and recorder lessons. It has even been a subject for practical mathematics, checking on the builders by measuring the radius and the height of the wall.

In summer, prize-giving, and an open-day entertainment will probably be held there.
