GLOSSARY

- AWHYLLE - a wheel
- ANDIRON - Large fire-dogs with hooks at different levels which supported a spit for cooking in front of an open hearth.
- BACKHOUSE - a service or store room at the back of the house
- BALLOWS - bellows
- BED - in the 16th century a bed only referred to bedding
- BENYS - beans
- BEYES - bees
- BOARD - (bord) a flat wooden surface such as a table top, the supports are mentioned separately, such as trestles
- BOARDED BEDSTEAD - Bedsteads with panels or wainscot at the head or at both ends
- BRANDIRON - an alternative name for gridiron
- BUTTERY - a service room in which ale was kept; also used for food storage and general stores
- CARPET - never put on the floor but used on the table or on benches
- CHAFING DISH - used to keep food hot
- CHANSTEYCKE - canstyke, candlestick
- CHARME - churn
- CHAYER - chair
- CHEVERLIT - coverlet
- CHEYRE - chair
- CHOSIN - cushion
- CHOWBERDE - cupboard
- CLOWTHES - clothes
- COBURDE - cupboard
- COFFER - a wooden box or chest covered with leather
- COTBERDE - cupboard
- COUE - cow
- CREPE - crop
- COURT CUPBOARD - an open cupboard for the display of plate consisting of two open tiers with a pot board at the base
- COWERYND - covering
- DISSON - dozen
- DOSSER - a pair
- DOWE - dough
- DRIPPING PAN - the pan put beneath revolving spit
- DYSYS - dishes

- FEATHERBED - a mattress stuffed with down or small soft feathers
- FIRE PIKE - similar to a long poker and used in the hearth
- FLITCH - the side of an animal usually of bacon
- FLOCKBED - a mattress stuffed with flock
- FODES - fodder; food for cattle
- FRYNE PAN - frying pan
- FURNACE - this was a brewing lead and not a furnace as we know it
- FRAME - the legs and rails of a table, always valued separately from the top and referred to as a table and frame
- GIRDLE - a belt encircling the hips
- GRIDIRON - an iron gate
- HANGER - a piece of iron or chain attached to the chimney on which hung the pothooks
- HOWSYS - house
- HYE - hay
- HYNE - hen
- IEMES - irons
- IOYNED - joined
- JOINED - furniture made by a joiner
- KANSTYKE - candlestick
- KEVERING - covering
- KEVERLID - coverlet
- KEVER - a shallow wooden tub
- KNEADING TROUGH - a trough used in breadmaking made of wood, with splayed sides and a partition down the middle, one side for the dough, and the other for flour.
- KINE - cow
- LAVOR - a wash basin
- LAND - a strip of arable land in the open fields, usually about $\frac{1}{2}$ acre in area.
- MASLIN - (masslen, mastlin) mixed grain, usually rye and wheat
- MOULDING BOARDS - benches or boards on which the bread was shaped before baking

- PEWTER - an alloy of tin and lead used for making pots, pans, plates and cutlery
 PILLOWBERE - pillow case or slip
 POEUGHTER - pewter
 PORINSH DISH - a porridge pot
 PORRENGER - an earthenware pot
 POSNET - a small metal pot for cooking; having a handle and three feet
 POTTENGERS - soup bowls
 POWDERING TROUGH - a tub for salting and pickling meat
 PRESS - an early type of cupboard
 PULSE - leguminous crops such as peas and beans, sometimes vetches

 RUFFE - roof

 SACERS - saucers
 SALT - a salt cellar
 SETTLE - a seat or bench for several people often with a high back
 SHITE - sheet
 SHOULD, SHOUL, SHOWLE, SHOUEL - shovel
 SHYLLES - shelves
 SKILLET ☞ a metal pan with a long handle and three short legs for setting on open fire
 SPENCE - a service room usually a larder or store room
 STOLE, STOLLE, STOWEL - stool
 STRAW CHAIR - a chair made of woven straw

 TABLE - the term "table" in the 16th century denoted only the top of a table, the legs and rail being called the frame
 TOWE - a misspelling of two
 TRUNDLEBED - a low bed on wheels which could be wheeled under an ordinary sized bed
 TWILLIE - a coarse linen fabric - usually refers to bed covering made of twill cloth
 TROWE - trough
 TUELL - towell
 TWYGEN STOOL - a stool made of wicker or twigs

 VALENCE - any length of material, often pleated or gathered, which is fitted horizontally to conceal a frame of some sort

 WAINSCOT - wood panelling
 WATTES - weights
 WHEYLL, WYELL - wheel
 WODDE - wood

YEARN - iron

YELLING VAT - dialect for gylling vat; the brewing vat where the wort is left to work after the yeast has been added; or any brewing vat

YEOTING VAT - from yote, meaning to soak; probably where the barley was soaked prior to the making of malt.

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
