



Juggins family


There appear to be two branches of this family identifiable, the first with this family tree.



A separate document shows John born 16/10/1788 and unmarried; Additional children of Thomas and Alice were Elizabeth, b. 5/1/1791; James b. 25/7/1799, innkeeper at Waterperry and married Ann Bolton; William, b. 26/8/1804


1. The family lived at the Old Parsonage and also rented the Old Granary. The matriarch of this family was Ann Juggins, living there in the 1760s with Robert, her husband, who died in 1770 after an arm amputation, presumably from a farming accident. Ann took over the farm. Their sons were Thomas and William. William appears to have taken the reins by 1813 when he was awarded 97 acres in the Enclosure Award, shown in yellow. William was unmarried and died in December 1837 aged 80.

The family were also the tenants of the Manor, but whether they lived in it is unknown. Brocas papers show that in 1806 Thomas Juggins was a yearly tenant paying £232 rent for 268 acres 3 roods 37 perches. In 1809 Arthur Young in his survey of Oxfordshire agriculture admired Mr Juggins' threshing machine.



John Juggins, one of the children of Thomas and Alice moved into The Mount, was a supporter of cockfighting, and became an opponent of Elton. He believed that Elton had insulted his sister with a pointed quotation from the Psalms. He died in 1870.

2. The family at Mott House. In 1792 William Biggs left Mott House to his niece Elizabeth Juggins who left it to her son, Robert, who left it to his sisters Elizabeth and Ann in 1837. Father, Thomas, was living there at the time. Ann left Mott House to her son John, who left it to her son also John. It is not known how they were connected with the other Juggins.
