A windmill 'work-in'

on a windmill in Wheatley?

The Wheatley Windmill Restoration Society is planning a "work-in" at the mill next weekend and is asking for volunteers to come along to help.

The society is dependent on volunteer help for restoration work at the 200 year-old mill and is hoping to attract skilled and unskilled workers to the working weekend and to gain their interest on a more long-term basis.

Jobs likely to be tackled are the cleaning up of icrap timber for re-use, leaning of masony joints refore repointing and sossibly the erection of nore scaffolding. Skilled workers are needed for obs such as putting in new window frames.

It won't all be plain sailing — volunteers are dvised to bring work loves to avoid blisters — ut there are plenty of sois on the site and work elmets will be provided.

Mr Wilf Foreman, a sember of the Restoration Society's committee and a national windmill ther, will be on hand uring the weekend to orplain the workings of the mill and the restoration project to any terested volunteers.

Mr Foreman, a former draughteman who now devotes all his time to work on wind and water-mills, said the complete restoration of the Wheat-ley mill would be a long job. However, it didn't matter if it took ten years; it would be far better to see it all put back into working condition during that time than left for that period to decay and finally fall down.

Mr Foreman said the recent removal of the decayed cap and sails had meant the disappearance of the familiar silhouette from the skyline and had possibly given the impression that the mill was lost.

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"Far from it. That was a necessary step towards final restoration, which is taking place from the bottom of the tower upwards," he said.

The windmill is sited on high ground to the south west of Wheatley and can be reached from Ladder Hill or from Gidley Way, Horspath — Windmill Lane links these two Hill or from Gidley Way, Horspath — Windmill Lane links these two roads.
